

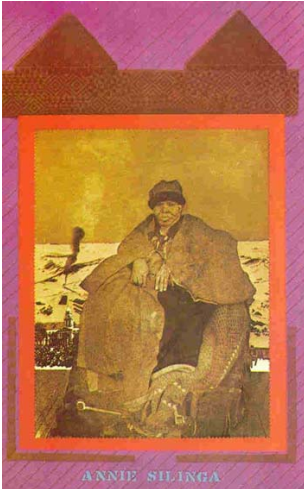

ANNIE SILINGA

Took a lifelong decision never to carry a pass. "I will carry a pass the day the Prime Minister's wife does". It was a decision that led to personal harassment and deportation to the Transkei, away from her family. Annie was a founder member of the South African Federation of Women, one of the 20 000 who marched to Pretoria on 9 August 1956. She was a patron of the UDF and died in 1984. It is because of the sacrifices and contributions of women like Annie Silinga that South Africa celebrates 10 years of democracy.

"Our heritage is unique and precious and it cannot be renewed. Our heritage celebrates our achievements and contributes to redressing past inequities" (a quote from the National Heritage Resources Act which enables and encourages communities to nurture and conserve their legacy so that it may be bequeathed to future generations.
